Your submission

The Long-Term Plan is a continuation of the compulsory monopoly we are forced to endure with regards to "environmental" matters. Ecan obtains revenue through coercion and then offers "consultation" with regards to how to spend the funds – similar to a bandit returning to your house after they have "paid" themselves to ask for ideas about how the remaining loot should be spent.
