PURPOSE

To provide background on Plan Change 5 (PC5) to the Canterbury Land and Water Regional Plan (LWRP) ahead of a briefing to be provided at this Kaikōura Water Zone Committee meeting.

BACKGROUND

PC5 is comprised of two parts:

- <u>Part A</u>: includes new region-wide nutrient management policies and rules that relate to the use of land for a farming activity. The proposed rules will eventually replace the existing region-wide nutrient management rules.
- <u>Part B:</u> applies to the Waitaki sub-region and includes provisions which have been drafted for the purpose of achieving the water quality recommendations in the Upper and Lower Waitaki ZIP addendums.

Part A of PC5 incorporates the outputs from the Matrix of Good Management Practice Project (MGM). The MGM project is a collaborative project involving regional councils, technical staff and industry representatives. The purpose of the project is to establish good management practices and good management practice loss rates for a range of farming activities.

The region-wide nutrient management provisions in Part A of PC5 will eventually replace the existing nutrient management rules in the region-wide section of the LWRP. The changes proposed have been developed to:

- **Overcome OVERSEER version changes.** For example, PC5 achieves this by removing the fixed nitrogen leaching loss rate figures in the permitted activity rules (e.g. the 10kg/ha/yr and 20kg/ha/yr permitted activity thresholds) and instead replaces these with activity based thresholds (e.g. ha of irrigation).
- Require farming activities to implement **Good Management Practice**. This is achieved by requiring permitted farming activities to implement Management Plans, and by requiring farming activities that require a resource consent to comply with Good Management Practice Loss Rates and implement Farm Environment Plans (FEPs).
- **Targeted management of phosphorus**. This is achieved by requiring farming activities that require a resource consent and which are located in the High Risk P zone, to identify in their FEPs those actions that will be implemented to manage and minimise phosphorus loss.
- Require farming activities to register with the **Farm Portal**. The Portal will generate GMP numbers that account for overseer changes, different farming types and local climate and soil conditions. The Portal will also enable Environment Canterbury to undertake catchment accounting.

It is anticipated that PC5 will be notified in either late 2015 or early 2016. Council is considering whether the rules in PC5 will have delayed legal effect until PC5 is operative. The presentation will explain the implications of PC5 for this zone.

Council's intent is that the key features and concepts in Part A of PC5 will provide a framework for the development of future sub-region sections of the Plan.

Purpose

To update the Zone Committee on the progress of approved Immediate Steps projects.

Recommendation

That the Zone Committee receives this update.

Background

The purpose of the Immediate Steps (IS) funding programme is to protect and restore freshwater biodiversity in Canterbury.

After having received information relating to the freshwater values in the Kaikōura Zone, the Zone Committee decided not to limit the allocation of IS funds to a certain freshwater habitat type, or geographical area. In December 2011, the Zone Committee decided that they would like to see priority given to projects that fit with certain criteria. The criteria specified included projects which:

- have long term protection (i.e. QEII covenants)
- link in with or support existing projects
- have high visibility and are accessible to the public.

In addition to the above criteria, the Zone Committee has subsequently chosen three areas as priorities in their Zone Implementation Programme; the Clarence/Waiau Toa River, Lyell/Waikōau Creek and Lakes Rotorua and Rotoiti. The Zone Committee has agreed that Immediate Steps funding will also be used to help support projects within these priority areas.


Funding

The Zone Committee has \$100,000/year for five years. To date 16 projects have been funded by Immediate Steps. The total amount committed to projects to date is just over \$383,420 leaving approximately \$116,580 of IS funds yet to allocate given a \$500,000 (5 year) funding programme. Regionally, the Immediate Steps programme has been extended by another year, therefore, the Kaikōura Zone Committee has until the end of June 2016 to allocate the original \$500,000 worth of Immediate Steps funds.

Waimangarara River
