The three proposed solutions to addressing the \$4m shortfall in the public transport budget all result in users paying more for a worse service. This does not seem to be a particularly sustainable solution that will increase patronage or offer opportunities for improving services over the long term, both of which are needed for the city.

I therefore propose an alternative solution, based on overseas experience.

Option 4 - introduce "free public transport" for all tertiary students in the region, paid for by way of a mandatory, subsidised lump sum payment from each enrolled student per semester. This payment would be collected via tertiary establishments as part of their in-built student services levies.

This system was in place in a Canadian city I lived and studied in with similar population and public transport infrastructure to that of Christchurch. Students at the city's two universities paid approximately

CAD\$50 per semester as part of their university fees, in return for free use of the city's bus services (showing student ID). It was a popular scheme that resulted in widespread use of the bus service and reduced transport costs for students.

In addition to providing a large, stable source of revenue for the Council (with which it might be in a position to improve services over the long term), such a strategy would serve to encourage more sustainable transport choices for the region's student population, in line (I am sure) with the overall sustainability goals of tertiary establishments themselves.
