Canterbury Surely this reason (stated below) alone should be enough to decline the permits. "Our assessment predicted that only two species, Hector's dolphins and New

Zealand fur seals, were likely to be frequently present in the immediate vicinity of the proposed outfall. For Hector's dolphins this conclusion is based on the relatively high number of sightings (23) and strandings (20) for this species in the AOI (Table 2), coupled with the fact that this species demonstrates an inshore distribution (Slooten et al., 2006) with a preference for shallow turbid waters (Brager et al., 2003). The significance of Hector's dolphins in the area is also reinforced by the reported presence of calves (from four of the 23 sighting records) and that this species is considered as 'Nationally Vulnerable' under the New Zealand Threat Classification System (Baker et al., 2019)."
