Bussing is incredibly expensive currently; if I want to visit friends in Rolleston a round trip for me and my partner is around \$20! That's just not a feasible cost for a full time University student, and because of that it means that I am simply unable to see a lot of my friends regularly (which ends up having repercussions on mental health). Having free fares for under 25s is also a great idea because it means that young people will get used to using the bus, leading to greater revenue when those under 25s become older and continue to bus. Christchurch also has a traffic problem (and of course pollution), so having this free bussing option will encourage students and young people to get off the road. Even reduced fares won't actually do a huge amount IMO as students are still desperate to save money and driving, even with the price of gas, feels cheaper 99% of the time and is more convenient.
