Tell us more about why you support the selected bus fare option.		
I think enabling young people, disabled people and people on a low income or the benefit to take the bus without worrying about whether they can afford it would help the overall well-being of those groups of people. I myself am a beneficiary because I am unable to work, and sometimes it's a real struggle to be able to afford the \$10 minimum to top up my metro card, and the cash fare is far too expensive for me to even consider unless it's an emergency. Getting around a city the size of Christchurch can be a pain even for people with their own transport, so removing the barrier of cost from accessing public transport in our city for those who need it the most would be incredibly beneficial for the city as a whole. When the young people and the disadvantaged are able to travel freely whenever they need to, their mental health would be greatly improved - I know mine certainly would be.		
Any other comments on bus fares?		
I think the current cash fares are very steep, especially when you compare them to what it costs to use a metro card instead. I understand that part of the reason for this is to encourage folks to use a card, but I feel this actively punishes those who choose not to for whatever reason. The fact that the card itself costs \$10 without any credit on it must be a huge barrier to entry for some more disadvantaged and low-income people. If you want to continue to keep the cash fares at what they are, I would suggest making the metro card itself much cheaper, or ideally, free.
