As a student at UC, living in Hornby, without a car, I rely on buses - often multiple buses - to get me to Uni and back. I'm currently having to pay for this by using my Course Related Costs through Studylink, which increases the amount I'll have to pay back. Free buses would massively open up my accessibility to study, as well as other facilities around the city that I just don't take advantage of because of the price. I also support this option from a broader perspective - to increase this accessibility for all the listed groups would give new options to loads of people. Plus, the encouragement to bus rather than drive is a definite step in the right direction! Bussing can take more time as the schedule limits your options (if you have a class to get to, for example) but the knowledge that this option is free, rather than driving and paying for petrol/parking, would make it a lot more inviting.

Any other comments on bus fares?

In an ideal world, the regular rate could be \$2 alongside the free fares for certain groups, and there would be far more buses running more often, giving loads of people the motivation to use buses rather than cars. But focusing on the world as it is - perhaps more promotion of the fact that your second bus (ie. transfer within 2 hours) is free, and there's a cap per day and for the week? I'm amazed how many people don't realise this.
