## Tell us more about why you support the selected bus fare option.

It's minimal cost for even a household on a strict budget (we have a student daughter in Canterbury who is in this category and uses the buses). If the first option is chosen those households on a strict budget will have their rents increased as their landlords pass on the increased rates to their tenants, when the tenants are already finding it hard with every other cost increasing. I also know many households in Canterbury where they are property owners on a strict budget and the increased rates will be crippling to their already struggling households.

## Any other comments on bus fares?

My student daughter has said she would be happy paying \$2/bus trip, so I assume that would be indictative of most students. My friends who are feeling the pinch would also be happy with that. They would not be happy with rates increase/landlords increasing rent to cover their costs.

# How else might we pay for our share of this work?

Cutting costs in ECan. No one and I mean no one can afford to have you to borrow money because fuel, food, housing, electricity has all had a significant increase in the past 12 months. People are REALLY struggling out there.

How do you think recovery from flooding of this scale – events that impact state highways, bridges, rail and power for example – should be funded in the future?

A portion of the current ECan rates put aside every year. Money diverted from other projects. In Christchurch, there were drainage boards, and those employed by them were experts and prevented many floods.

Prices of every essential is increasing (some of it due to global lockdowns and shipping restrictions) and I just wonder how families, students, pensioners, beneficiaries, refugees and anyone else on a strict budget will survive with ECan increasing their rates. I can see all costs are understandably passed on from landlords and for those lucky to own their own homes, many are really struggling. Common sense would go down well.
