	Greg Stanley unable to attend previous meeting. Greg will give an update on Climate Resilience Programme today via teams.	
	Rūnanga to give update about their projects, Michael will give an update during today's meeting.	
	Request for meeting to be hosted in Kurow.	
	Request for Canada geese to be included in the agency feral animal meeting. This meeting was only limited to feral pigs and deer.	
2.2	Council Update	
	Deliberated and voted on Annual Plan, there was some biodiversity programme funding lost and biosecurity didn't lose any funding.	
	Wallaby funding workshop to be hosted on 9 th June to discuss different ways of funding for control in the containment area. This isn't open to the public but the outcome will be publicly available.	
	Proposed subsidy with New Zealand auto-traps for community groups. This is an ongoing discussion.	
2.3	Rūnanga Update	
	Restoration programme on Rangitata River – restoring the Mauri and Whakapapa of the Awa after flooding events.	
	2 main groups of 12 staff, working in two locations (Lagoon-Peel Forest) and (Peel Forest-Gorge)	
	Establishing a nursery, growing approximately 6000 plants per week.	
	Main activities include planting and upkeep, removing invasive species and working with farmers.	
	Working with 5 Star Beef – identifying areas of significance and planting.	
	Waipopo Lagoon – blocked 4WD access to prevent people driving and dumping rubbish.	

Project in Burkes Pass, planning and maintenance working alongside Mackenzie District Council, funded by the OTOP water zone committee.

Are the operation being carried out by Rūnanga members or contractors?

 Michael: Predominately lead by Rūnanga but some contractors are onboard too.

3 Public Forum

3.1 Wallace Milne from Hakataramea Sustainability Collective joins us.

Focusing on engagement with local community as the group is still relatively new.

Funding from Environment Canterbury has enabled for spray of gorse and broom, this has included a couple of community days.

Juliet Gray and Sarah Elliot have been working on securing more funding.

Laurence: Hakataramea Velley is a designated site-led area for gorse and broom control, some money has been given previously but there may be an opportunity to contribute in the upcoming year.

Gary: Apart from gorse and broom, what other pests/weeds are up there?

- Wallace: there is some barberry and cotoneaster, there have been some operations to remove wilding conifers too. Now lupin has become prevalent in the last 5 years in the upper reaches of the valley.
- Brent: There's been lots of money spent in that area, controlling willow and lupin.

Rich: Is there buy in from the community?

 Wallace – Yes, there is. Group is working in with the local school to get a nursery up and running. There have been conversations with local Rūnanga on ideas how best to undertake this.

What other assistance is being sought after? Can we (the BAG's) feedback to the community to help you?

• Wallace: there's nothing in particular at the moment, current focus is awareness of the group in the community.

	Wallace: How are things going in the Hakataramea? There are still lots of trees near Grampians	presentation with group.
	 Steve: There has just been a boom spraying operation, so results may not show for a little while. 	
	Is there a plan B if there's a lack of MPI funding?	
	 Steve: Hope of a good business case to MPI, will lose 80% of achievements in the next 5 years if funding stops. Need to understand that there will be a time when there is no MPI funding, we need to work with landowners to protect the investment. It is up to the landowner what to do with the land afterwards, but if it's left then can be reinvaded. 	
	Brent shared a wallaby update	Rich to share wallaby video with
	Winter is prime wallaby control time. Removing wilding conifers also removes habitat for wallaby.	group.
	Working on a resource consent from the Mackenzie District Council to install a fence that will help with the passive spread of wallaby.	
	Signs have recently been installed in road reserve to encourage reporting.	
	 Ines: Has there been any feedback around these signs? 	
	 Brent: Reports have increased from within the containment zone, one sign has been vandalised so may need to look putting them on adjacent private land. 	
	Nassella tussock population trend monitoring	
	 Cllr Mackenzie: Is nassella spreading in North Canterbury due to land occupier non-compliance or things like climate change? 	
	 Laurence: This is mostly due to landowners letting it seed and not grubbing. 	

4.3 Climate Resilience Programme Update

Greg Stanley presentation

• Cllr Mackenzie: How are the plantings being protected from wallaby?

Greg: Plant guards and regular upkeep. Shooting through the growing season where browsing is occurring and budget allows.

4.4 BAG Review Workshop

Cllr Munro: Disconnect with protection of indigenous biodiversity. Currently sits on Biodiversity Champions Group, an improved connectivity is required.

Cllr Mackenzie: We are very production focussed, how do we protect indigenous biodiversity or mahinga kai?

 Rich: There has been a focus on production as we undertake compliance inspections on productive land. This has been at the request of the community. Our future focus will change things hopefully to include more biodiversity values.

- Gary: Can we cover more topics for urban communities? eg. garden escapee species alongside production.

- Rob: There is an overlap with what's been talked about in the zone committees. This can help with future discussion planning; they can be invited along and vice versa.
- Angela: More engagement with catchment groups.

	 Angela: Do we need a facilitator if these groups are advisory groups rather than formal committee? 	
	Can chairs sometimes facilitate?	
	 Rob: Sometimes hard getting facilitators who are right for the group, can cut good conversations short or not steer in the right direction. There is also a cost. 	
	Cllr Mackenzie: Important for members to decide what type of group they want to be. This presentation is ECan perspective currently, members need to give there feedback also.
