	to climate change?	
	 Laurence: No, it's down to landowners not undertaking grubbing before the plants set seed. 	
	 Pam: Will forestry supress the growth of nassella? Laurence: Unlikely, as they usually get milled, thinned or pruned which opens the canopy and lets light in. It's also expensive for control as you need to go down each row. The planting of native species, specifically for the purpose of long term-suppression of pest species like Chilean needle grass have proven successful. 	Laurence to share gorse and broom maps for Banks Peninsula with group.
