4 **Main Discussion Items** 4.1 Regional and local programmes update The update is taken as read. This is an opportunity to ask questions or comment on the update provided. Feral Animal Management Strategy – released by DOC. No other information about strategy is available to ECan yet. A high-level meeting with DOC is to be organised to talk about it. Hopefully, they will include community views. Fiona – Is there an opportunity for DoC to come and speak to this group about the strategy? Laurence to follow up with Question: Is it likely to follow the tahr program? DoC and ask Rich – It is aimed at having more open dialogue and for someone community involvement in decision making so as not to to speak to repeat the same challenges from the past. the new Question: Is there a reason why feral ungulates, and particularly strategy. deer are so out of control? Hunter are after trophies, not hunting females. Recreational areas don't always allow hunting. Culls didn't bring the numbers down. Breeding faster than the hunters can kill them. Nassella Tussock Successful field day down south, 30 people in attendance. Hurunui area – population increase – A predicted increase in plants over the next few years. Question: What is the population of nassella like in Mid Canterbury? Laurence - Central averages at approximately 4 plants per hectare. Some properties do have high density, but most are quite low. Fiona – Is there a chance that nassella could spread further due to climate change? Laurence – Yes, as things dry out. The big issue remains are the number of plants still being left to seed due to grubbing being left too late in the season. Fiona - What do numbers need to get up to reduce stock numbers? Is this a problem with the 170 properties that still have high no.? Laurence – Not a problem yet. High numbers in 1940/50's did havepeople walking off properties as

couldn't carry enough stock however stock numbers are lower than what they used to be. Invasive organism update Fiona – Could Ecan provide a promo for the reporting tool that Paige to write has been developed to go to the Wilding Conifers Group and piece for Castle Hill Village? Castle Hill Village newsletter. Gorse and Broom – Proposed change to inspection process Cllr Mackenzie – Should we be inspecting for other organisms (e.g. wilding pines) while undertaking gorse & broom inspections? Laurence – We are exploring ways that we can inspect properties in a more general area. Can be difficult as pests/weeds aren't also visible at the same time. Cllr Mackenzie – Why are we not covering DoC land as well? Laurence - On DoC and Crown Land only the good neighbour rule applies. We inspect gorse & broom on productive land which DoC land isn't (apart from site lead). We would be spending ratepayer money on land that doesn't pay rates. National Wilding conifer control program Maree – Operational report was received from Steve Palmer. There have been volunteer days in Craigieburn (9 days). Tramping and school groups, Forest & Bird volunteers to support maintenance control. It is working well and this model could be used in other areas. Upper Waimakariri weeds strategy update Funding has helped with the development of a weeds survey and strategy, to help direct pest and weed control over the next 5-10 years in the Upper Waimakariri Catchment. Rich is currently coordinating meetings, but the next level of operational coordination to deliver the strategy will require more discussions. 4.3 Five-year Business Plan Feedback Unfortunately, Carl not available to take feedback at the meeting.

Rich – A hard copy of the 5-Year Business Plan was sent out before

Christmas, is there any additional feedback?

General comments received that the plan is clear and concise.

No other specific feedback received.

Helen –How are issues of land tenure being resolved around riverbeds with regard to weed control.

• LINZ, DOC etc meeting in November when all together to discuss who is doing what or who is owning what in the riverbeds.

Improvements.

- Michael A lot of confusion between Biosecurity and Biodiversity has muddied understanding and conversation.
- Maree Members need to understand topics so they can be advocates in the community.
- Andy Good to remember we are an advisory group; our job is to support biosecurity
- Fiona Have an opportunity to share what is going on in 'our' local community that we can bring to this space as individual members. This is currently happening in other committees

Length and frequency of meetings.

 Group in agreement with length and frequency recommendations shared by Rich.

Content

 Andy - Is there an opportunity for region-wide issues to be addressed by groups who come together to discuss them to save less repetition across meetings?

Rich – This is dependent on the subject but can certainly look at options for regionally focused discussion groups. Purpose of the BAG's is to think regionally and act locally.

Zoe – Good idea to come up with a sub-committee where region-wide issues were discussed.

Cllr Mackenzie – Individuals come with a different focus to BAG meetings but regionally they might connect with other members from other BAG's.

Meeting Style

- Fiona It would be beneficial to use the 'Rooms' feature on Microsoft Teams to assist in the online meeting format.
- Cllr Mackenzie It is still critical for the chair and vice-chair to keep time and keep on subject. Perhaps don't stray too much from how the chair keeps the meeting to help achieve the goal of the meetings.
- Barry Can we have more field days outdoors and more education? ECan has a reputation with the community, too much pressure on farmers they want to give up. How can we make it better? Make farmers aware of rules?

Facilitation

- Fiona Is it better for Rich to be facilitating the meeting or actively participating? Where is the most value
- Andy Not in favour of an external facilitator/expert.
- Cllr Mackenzie Maybe there could be different approaches for different topics.

Membership

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- Cllr Mackenzie Do we need a councillor or a staff member present from the council? Worth thinking about where we can get the most value added to these groups.
- Fiona Likes members being clear on what the conversation at the meeting will be about, being provided with quality information prior to meetings.
