4.1	BAG review update	
	Laurence ran through presentation	Rich to share presentation with meeting notes
	Thank you to everyone for your contribution over the last term. We hope to see some people back next year.	
4.2	Feral Ungulate Strategy – Te Ara ki Mua	Rich to share strategy with meeting notes
	Laurence spoke with Andy Thompson from the Department of Conservation (DoC) regarding a representative attending a future BAG meeting. He had advised he was not the best person to speak about the feral ungulate's strategy.	
	Laurence has been speaking with another contact, Pete Thomas who is based on the West Coast. Pete is happy to come and speak at the next BAG meeting in March.	
	Pete shared that there is \$30 million dollars available nationally to be spend over the next four years. The approach is currently focussed on quick wins supporting work that is already underway, including providing some funding on Banks Peninsula to enhance the feral goat eradication programme.	
	Laurence: What does this group see as ECan's role moving forward?	

- Laurence: Could involve facilitation and guidance
- Roger: Does ECan run any control programmes at the moment?
- Laurence: Feral goats are declared pests on Banks Peninsula only, but we are not on the ground controlling them. There is a pig working group on Banks Peninsula currently, there is no control programme in place.
- Roger: Is any of the \$30 million being given to ECan for control?
- Laurence: No, it won't.
- Laurence: ECan Biosecurity was invited to the original meeting with high level agencies but hasn't been invited back.
- Nicky: This strategy doesn't stack up against the Legislation and that is something to be aware of. The Wild Animal Control Act sets out priorities for animal numbers etc and this strategy won't achieve them.
- Andy: This problem will hit hard in the next decade, could become a worse issue than wallaby.
- Laurence: Besides feral goats on Banks Peninsula there are no other ungulates declared as pests in the regional pest management plan. Organisms of Interest are those species that didn't make it through the process to get into the plan. However, they are being reassessed by Morgan Shields for potential future inclusion.
- Nicky: ECan's role should be telling DoC what the strategy framework is and what the priorities are. 'Keeping them honest.'
- No one is officially monitoring animal numbers so no one can lobby DoC about fulfilling what they're supposed to deliver via the Wild Animal Control Act.
- Cllr Mackenzie: ECan has little jurisdiction on DoC crown land. DoC and Land Information New Zealand (LINZ) need to understand where their responsibility lies.
- Carl: If a species isn't a declared pest in the RPMP, we don't have jurisdiction to enforce under the Biosecurity Act. We can't pick up new pieces of work (e.g. monitoring) that aren't in the plan, long term plan etc. without something else dropping off. It would need to go through council for funding options etc.

 Andy: It is very hard to get evidence that animals are being assisted to spread around the region. People need to be caught in the act.

## 4.3 Regional and local programme update

Marine Biosecurity – Carl

It is important for the success of marine biosecurity that everyone is working together. Carl Attended a recent hui between Ngāti Wheke, ECan, NIWA and MPI about this.

There is currently a source of Mediterranean fan worm on docks at Lyttelton Port that cannot be accessed as they're unsafe. ECan has given 75K to Whaka Ora, working in partnership and developing a plan for moving forward.

A marine biosecurity officer will be hired next year.

The Ministry for Primary Industries are currently writing a surveillance plan for Mediterranean fan worm.

- Roger: Is ECan currently monitoring for exotic marine species?
- Carl: Currently in Lyttelton for fan worm, as it is considered high risk area. There is a disjointed effort across New Zealand. The strategy was meant to be written by MPI and has been talked about for several years. It was close to being finished 18 months ago, ECan was told the strategy was 3 months away then it went quiet. Could be due to staff movement.

## **Great Willowherb**

MPI is looking at transferring the programme to Regional Councils. It's not in the plan but is an unwanted organism so currently we can inspect but not control. We might need to include in the RPMP but it's difficult to add species without a full-scale review.

The geese near the Avon Heathcote are targeted as they are directly in the flight path. There seems to be a lack of geese near Bromley now due to works in the area. That may be why the public are seeing higher geese numbers in other areas.</li> <li>Laurence: Will be attending a meeting on 12<sup>th</sup> Oct to discuss geese with MPI. Maybe there is potential to expand this further than the Avon Heathcote?</li> <li>Nicky: The gravel management strategy is up for review. It might be a good place for biosecurity to be heard.</li> <li>Laurence is a member of the group so will push for</li> </ul>
